Tour Logs Another Success

Compatriot Joe Goldsmith and his Sites, Graves and Commemorations Committee have logged in another success with the 2006 Annual Historic Sites Tour! Good weather, a good attendance and a memorable program were the primary ingredients of visitation to Laurens/Greenwood Revolutionary War sites.

A significant feature of the day's program was the naming of another bridge as a Memorial to the Patriots of the Little River Regiment. The bridge

is located on SC Highway 72, between Greenwood and Clinton (near Rock Bridge Presbyterian Church); an attractive green highway sign with white lettering names the bridge. Last year a bridge was named to honor General James Williams, the organizer and leader of the "Little River Regiment." Williams died in the Battle of Kings Mountain, the highest ranking Patriot to give his life at the battle that Thomas Jefferson described as "the turning point" of the War.



Dr. Lynwood D. Jordan of Woodruff was honored last year for his years of service to the Cowpens Battlefield in the planning of the annual observance of the Battle. A member of the Daniel Morgan Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, Dr. Jordan has planned the wreath laying ceremony for nearly 15 years. He was presented an Oak Leaf Cluster for Meritorious Service by the National Society Sons of the American Revolution. This year's wreath laying ceremony will be held at 2:00 p.m. on January 13, 2007.

SAR members pay homage to Compatriot Thomas Heyward Jr.

Ridgeland – White haired members of the Sons and Daughters of the American Revolution gathered to pay homage to their compatriot in front of his tomb Saturday morning.

Each year, about 50 members from area chapters make a pilgrimage to Thomas Heyward Jr.'s burial site at Old House Cemetery on S.C. 462 near Ridgeland, about 100 yards from where Heyward was born.

They meet just before the Fourth of July to honor the day the Declaration of Independence was approved by the Continental Congress. Heyward was one of four South Carolinians to sign the document in which 13 colonies in North America declared themselves independent of Great Britain.

“That’s why we’re here – that’s what the Fourth of July is all about, isn’t it?” said Paul Grier, regional vice president of the S.C. Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. He made the trip from his home on Hilton Head Island.

A handwritten copy of the document is on display in the National Archives in Washington, but Caroline Jenkins and Anne Heyward don’t have to travel quite that far to feel a connection with Heyward’s past. The sisters are Heyward’s sixth-generation descendants.

Anne Heyward, a Port Royal resident, said she is the last Heyward to have been born in Old house. She said she was born in a house that is now an overgrown vacant lot just up the street from the cemetery.

“The first time we came (to

the cemetery) we were about four and five years old, Anne Heyward said.

“We used to call him Great Father,” Jenkins said, remembering a moniker the family used to reference Heyward.

Anne Heyward said the property the cemetery is on was private property before their mother purchased it more than 30 years ago and gave it to Jasper County with the hope that it would be preserved.

After the Hilton Head High School Navy Junior ROTC Color Guard marched the flag

in front of an oxidized metal bust of Heyward’s likeness that rests on top of his tall, granite memorial marker Richard Austin spoke about plans to preserve Heyward’s memory. Austin, president of the Hilton Head Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution, said former Beaufort Mayor Henry C. Chambers is raising money to buy the land surrounding the cemetery to make into a park.

Elizabeth Waskiewicz, member of the Beaufort-based Thomas Heyward Jr. chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, said a park would

be a good idea as she wove through the crowd distributing copies of a booking pamphlet form about Heyward written by local historian Gerhard Spieler in 1978.

Waskiewicz said that many years have passed since Heyward’s death in 1809, but the tradition of celebrating his contribution to the state’s history is still alive.

“I think more and more people want to know where they came from, what their history is – I think it’s a new trend,” she said. “I don’t think that’s every going away.”

What Is The Sons Of The American Revolution?

The Sons of the American Revolution was incorporated on January 17, 1890 in Connecticut and later chartered by the United States Congress on June 9, 1906. Prior to this date a number of state societies were formed in the 1880's. These were led by The Sons of Revolutionary Sires, organized July 4, 1876 in San Francisco. The first Congress of the National Society was held in Louisville, Kentucky on April 30, 1890, which was the 101st anniversary of George Washington's taking the oath of office of President of the United States.

The National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution celebrated its centennial and the bicentennial of Washington's becoming President on April 30, 1989.

The purposes of the Sons of the American Revolution are patriotic, historical and educational. This includes:

- *Perpetuating the memory of Revolutionary War Patriots.
- *Promoting fellowship among their descendants.
- *Inspiring the community with a reverence for the principles of government founded by our forefathers.
- *Encouraging historical research of the American Revolution.
- *Preserving the records of Revolutionary War Patriots.
- *Marking the locations of the Revolution events and its soldiers.
- *Celebrating anniversaries of the Revolution.
- *Fostering true patriotism.
- *Maintaining and extending institutions of American freedom.
- *Carrying out the purposes of the Preamble of the Constitution.

*Following the injunctions of Washington's farewell address to the American people.

The National Headquarters is located in Louisville, Kentucky. There are 50 state societies including the District of Columbia. There are also societies in France, the United Kingdom, Canada, Germany and Switzerland.

The current membership is approximately 25,000 active members.

WHAT DOES THE ORGANIZATION DO?

*Honors persons for outstanding bravery and self sacrifice in the face of imminent danger.

*Honors members of the United States Congress for outstanding service to the nation.

*Honors outstanding high school students annually with the presentation of a Good Citizenship Award.

*Honor outstanding Junior and Senior ROTC cadets annually with the presentation of the ROTC Award.

*Honors Law Enforcement officials for outstanding service with a Law Enforcement Award.

*Honors Fire Safety Officials for outstanding service with a Fire Safety Commendation Award.

*Selects an outstanding Eagle Scout annually at the chapter, state and national level. The national winner receives a college scholarship.

*Assists veterans in Veterans Hospitals.

*Conducts a national historical orations contest annually.

*Sponsors Boy Scout troops and chapters of the Children of the American Revolution.

*Places SAR Markers at the gravesites of Revolutionary War Patriots and SAR Members.

*Commemorates Revolutionary War Patriots with appropriate ceremonies.

*Participates in new citizenship swearing-in ceremonies.

*Observes patriotic anniversaries.

*Cooperates with the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, Children of the American Revolution and other hereditary organization in the promotion of patriotism.

WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS FOR MEMBERSHIP

Any man of age eighteen

years or over, who is a lineal descendant of an ancestor who supported the war for American Independence is eligible for membership in Sons of the American Revolution. These ancestors referred to as Revolutionary War Patriots, include those persons who fought in the military and / or provided supplies to the American cause, served on political bodies supporting the Revolution, and those who signed oaths of support and similar acts.

If you believe that you may be eligible for SAR membership, ask the person from whom you received this pamphlet. In the event you cannot locate SAR members in your home area, visit the South Carolina state

SCSSAR Begins Granting Charters In 1923

The South Carolina Society was organized April 18, 1889 in a room at the State Capital in Columbia. After the election of officers, the organizing group appointed delegates to the proposed National Convention in New York City to be held later in the month. The National Society was organized April 30, 1889. These descendants of our brave ancestors, whose vision and courage gave us our great nation, formed a fraternal, patriotic, and civic organization to perpetuate the basic principle of freedom to honor our founding fathers. The name adopted by the organization was the Sons of the American Revolution.

The South Carolina Society began granting charters to chapters in 1923. Currently fifteen chapters promote the American spirit through fraternal meetings, commemorative observances of events and battles, educational materials, projects, lectures, tours and publications. South Carolina is rich in historical events of the American Revolution.

Area 1 Chapters Sponsor 20th Annual Pilgrimage

On July 1, 2006, Dr. George Mosse Chapter and Gov. Paul Hamilton Chapter, Sons Of the Hamilton Chapter, Sons Of the American Revolution, co-sponsored the 20th annual pilgrimage to the tomb of Thomas Heyward, Jr. This occasion marked the 230th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. From the mountains to the coast, South Carolina experienced the most battles and skirmishes of the war. The fifteen chapters of our society sponsor annual anniversary ceremonies of many of the battles and events.

Relics of the Revolution may be found throughout the state in some federal and state parks, museums, and libraries. Markers are found in our countryside reminding us of the sacrifice of our ancestors.

Since the organization of the South Carolina Society, over 3,000 have filled the membership ranks. The present membership is about 700.

before September 1, 2007, 50% of the presentation fee and all of the application fee are non-refundable. After September 1, 2007, no part of the presentation fee or application fee will be refundable. The presentation fee includes dinner for the Debutante and her escort, flowers and a gift for the Debutante.

Special arrangements have been made with the Charleston Place Hotel for participants and guests of the Colonial Ball. Well appointed rooms with two double beds are available at \$159.00 per night for Friday, December 21st, and Saturday, December 22nd, 2007. If reservations are identified as being associated with the Colonial Ball, the special rate will apply if made by Monday, December 3, 2007. Charleston Place Hotel is located on Meeting Street in the heart

The Colonial Ball, a very formal affair, has in recent years, presented debutantes from New York to Florida. The Debutantes will wear long white gowns (with at least 1/2" wide straps—no strapless gowns) and long white gloves (either cotton or kid). gloves), or white tie tartan (black shoes, white vest, white shirt with wing collar, white tie and gloves). Other men will wear "white tie," or tuxedo "black tie," or tartan.

Rules, Qualifications Stated For SCSSAR Scholarship

QUALIFICATIONS:

The applicant must be a high school senior in an accredited public or private school. Applicants do not have to be related to members of the SAR.

The SAR Scholarship is not awarded solely on academic achievement, but also on demonstration of those characteristics which best reflect the principles and beliefs of the SAR such as character, good citizenship, patriotism, both school and non school related extra-curricular activities, and well articulated, achievable goals.

APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS AND RULES:

1. The application form must be typewritten or printed in ink.

2. A recent picture must accompany the application.

3. An official transcript covering all high school work through the first session of the senior year. (If school regulations require, transcripts may be mailed directly by the school to the Scholarship Committee Chairman.)

4. Two letters of recommendation from persons other than relatives knowledgeable as to the applicant's academic record, patriotism, community service and character. One recommendation must be from a high school teacher and one from someone not associated with the high school or any other school the applicant has attended. Additional recommendations should NOT be submitted. (Recommendations are to be submitted in a sealed envelope with the signature of the person completing the recommendation written across the seal. Do not submit recommendations separately.)

5. A personal statement that should include information about the applicant's achievements, aspirations, principles and patriotism. (This statement is very important. Please include whatever you would like to tell us about yourself. This statement must be signed.

6. Signatures of two members of the Sons of the American Revolution in and recommend the applicant, but are not relatives or members of the Scholarship Committee. (Signatures must be legible and state and national numbers must be included.) Status of recommending members will be checked with the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution.

7. All materials must be submitted at one time with the possible exception listed in #3 above.

8. All materials must be completed and submitted directly in one mailing to the Scholarship

Committee chairman prior to January 31, 2007. (Applicant materials submitted by third parties or postmarked later than January 31, 2007 will not be accepted.)

9. Applicants may contact the chairman of the committee, but may not contact any member of the selection committee nor should anyone else contact any member of the selection committee on behalf of the applicant.

10. The chairman may conduct phone interviews on behalf of the committee with applicants as deemed necessary by the committee.

11. Selection is based on a point system with weighted points

for each category of criteria. All members of the selection committee have equal votes. The chairman has the sole authority to break any tie.

12. Disqualification: The chairman has the sole authority to rule on disqualification of a candidate.

Colonial Dames of America charter granted

on Fifth Avenue. The CDA President General presented the large document to her. Chapter XXXI - South Carolina will be officially installed in South Carolina in January 2007 at historic Hopsewee Plantation built ca. 1740, in Georgetown, the birthplace of Thomas Lynch, Jr. Signer of the Declaration of Independence, with CDA President General Audrey Chapin Svensson, a long time friend of the Kelloggs, coming from New York for the installation.

Colonial Dames of America, the oldest woman's patriotic society in the nation, was founded May 23, 1890 in New York City. Today there are chapters in many states, as

well as in London, England, Paris, France and Rome, Italy. At last, the very first chapter in the State of South Carolina has already been founded, chartered, and will soon be installed.

There are three societies called Colonial Dames: (1) Colonial Dames of America, founded 1890; and located in one of the few historic houses in New York City, the Mount Vernon Hotel Museum, built 1799; (2) National Society of Colonial Dames of America, founded 1891; and (3) Colonial Dames of the XVII Century, founded 1915. Dyane Dye Kellogg, a member of all three Colonial Dames, is the Founding President of Colonial Dames of America's Chapter XXXI - South Carolina.
